But how can we stay wide awake to God, when on the outside we are surrounded by so much noise, so much information, so many people needing our attention? And when we have so much inner noise - anxiety about the future, unprocessed events, decisions and choices to keep making?

What would it be like to be really awake? To see the world's pain and its beauty? To experience all my experiences?

"Stay awake with me and pray." Here is the important part. If Jesus is with us we can bear to see and hear reality. To stay awake with Jesus, and to pray, is to enter into the kind of companionship that he longed for his disciples to experience. To be completely alert to life's realities, but to allow that way of being present to also be a prayer - for peace, for reconciliation, to justice, for healing, for the living out of Christ's way on earth.

As we listen again to the stories of this holy season, may we find in them an invitation to stay fully awake to all that is happening in our lives and in our world, and to Volume 21, Number 4 April 2014

So much did He accomplish Through His death upon the cross And in His rising from the dead He reconciled us back to God




What Does Easter Mean?

CONFERENCE LOAN FUND INVESTMENT PROGRAM RE-OPENED

After not accepting funds for three years, the Susquehanna Conference Loan Fund Investment Program will be re-opened effective January 1, 2014. Investments will be accepted from Conference churches and active United Methodists within the geography of the Susquehanna Conference.

- The current interest rate being offered is 1.5% per annum.
- The minimum amount of investment cannot be less than \$500. Subsequent additions to an investment account must be \$500 or more.
- For individuals, the maximum investment is limited to \$150,000 and the maximum per household is \$300,000. The investment check(s) should be accompanied by a letter stating how the names should be titled on the Certificate of Deposit and a W-9 form with the Social Security Number of the first investor's name to be listed on the certificate.
- For churches, investment check(s) should be accompanied by a letter stating how the Churches name should be titled on the Certificate of Deposit and a W-9 form with the Churches Employer Identification Number [EIN].
- A copy of the W-9 form is on the back of this page.
- New investments are expected to remain invested for a one year period. After the one year period, they may be withdrawn upon demand.



Basic Needs and Health Care

The Social Service Assistant has been actively involving organizations to talk to the Sojourners about practical health care issues. Being disenfranchised and having insufficient income they often ignore their health issues and eat unhealthily because the most economical foods they purchase are the poorest nutritionally.

Educational talks have been given on diabetes, on blood pressure screening to detect if they need medical care, on dental education with free toothpaste, free flu shots given at STM, and even a Health Fair was held in house for them with the community invited.

Numbers Up for Thanksgiving and Christmas

Compared with 2012, Son Light House served 52 more households for Thanksgiving and 49 for Christmas in 2013. Thanks to all who made it possible to serve these families in need.

Monthly Average of Recipients Increased in 2013

The average number of households coming each month to Son Light House in 2013 was 568 representing 1,411 average monthly recipients. These figures represented a four percent increase over the previous year. This was the second largest monthly average since 2008 when the economic conditions took a dramatic downturn nationally.

New Households in 2013

A total of 146 new households came to Son Light House last year for assistance.
