Paul told the Galatians "But when the fullness of the time came, God sent forth His Son, born of a born under the woman. Law" [NASB]

The New Living Translation states it like this: "But when the right time came, God sent his Son, born of a woman, subject to the law." [NLT]

My guess is that if it would have been up to us to send God's Son into the world, with our busy schedules we would have put it off or tried to extend the date and he still wouldn't have been sent. Good thing it was up to God!

Not only do we celebrate the birth of Christ, we also celebrate God's love and presence with us every day, even in the hustle and bustle of the Christmas season. It's not God's fault that there are less days between Thanksgiving and Christmas this year. No matter when Christmas comes, it's perfect timing and it's the greatest gift we could ever receive. 


Coat Collection

Out of Chaos, Hope

"Out of Chaos, Hope" is the message printed on the back of Tshirts that the Morning Star Presbyterian Church Disaster Assistance, Bayville, N.J. gave volunteers who came to the aid of "The Sandy Storm".

Disaster relief, headed up by Pastor Myrlene, is one of the church's outreach to the community and seems like it is the only relief in the area.

George and Kay Showers recently went on a mission trip to help out with this relief effort and bring some sort of Hope to the community there.

Four volunteers from Annapolis, MD joined our group at Morning Star Presbyterian, our home for the week. The drywall hanging at one house was scrapped, because it was discovered the center of the house needed jacked up. Another house needed to have work done to remove a mold problem.

Nine of our group helped to put

insulation and plywood under one house. This house had never been insulated underneath. Also the deck was pulled in and attached to the house.

A couple of the women helped get some order and cleaning done since the house was still in a state of disarray from the storm. There were shelves built in the garage for storage.

George and Kay tagged along with a group to a house to work because there was no mold in that house. The woman who owned the house had a "for sale" sign on her property because she could not afford to rebuild. A Morning Star church member became aware and shared with the disaster committee. Thus volunteers were sent.

Upon entering and a quick inspection, "The laun [*plywood underlayment*] and tile could not be laid until the old floor was cleaned. We scraped for two days and set nails into the beautiful hardwood flooring that was beyond repair. By the end of the week the two bedrooms and kitchen and most of the living room had a new floor.

Bill and George took assessment of the doors that had been delivered as to where they were to be hung. George worked in one small bathroom to remodel it and make it more accessible. The drywall in another large bathroom had to be removed and new larger pieces placed in. They also had to work on rebuilding the window sills and molding around the windows.

We were in New Jersey almost a year to the day after Sandy. Many homes and business are still not useable or are condemned. Donna's home is in Seaside Heights. This town was the scene many saw on the news media where the roller coaster was in the ocean and the boardwalk and businesses burned.

All in all, with God's help, and many who have come to the area to continue the enormous task of cleaning up after Superstorm Sandy, some sort of hope will begin to emerge from the chaos.




