

Annual Conference 2014

Who likes to sing? Laugh? Visit friends? Make new Christian friends? Have a couple days [off] from the same old grind with lots of food and no dishes to do afterwards?

Annual conference with the theme "Alive in Christ Together Raising up Transformational Leaders" started Thursday June 12^{th,} 2014 with separate Clergy and Laity sessions at 9:30AM. The Laity were told "People who make a difference are not the ones with credentials... they are those with the right heart and mind. God is not concern about ability BUT availability. We know some of the disciples were fisherman, not educated men. But they were available when Jesus called.

An Opening Celebration with a spirited time of worship opened at 2:00PM. The worship time focused on engaging young adults in ministry. We were told only 25 percent of people between the ages of 19-35 are engaged in the church. Think of all the young people in our church of that age. Are they regularly involved? Friday morning six young adults led the conference in a worship-infused session which was focused on "sharing meaningful and faithful

reflection by young people".

Bishop Jeremiah J. Parks gave a message recalling how Queen Esther was called from silence to action by Mordecai. He quoted from the bible, "...and who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this?" Speaking of the recent court rulings regarding same sex marriages, the Bishop noted the of confusion our churches. While the church laws remain the same, people of the church are not of the same mind. Whatever position we take, he calls to be a church that lets the "LOVE of CHRIST ARISE". Bishop Parks also urged the Annual Conference not to lose perspective. The mission of the remains the church same: "Making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world." We hear this statement a lot even on our mission trips.

We came together again at 7:00 PM for a Memorial Service which opened with a dramatic reading from Revelations 21 that tells us there will be a new heaven and a new earth. Our District Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Thomas L. Salsgiver gave the message: "encouraging the conference to

go forward into a future without fear, knowing the saints are cheering us on."

We started Friday morning at 8:15 with a bible study with Rev. Yvette Davis asking us to listen to Christ calling us to give His grace to our brothers and sisters.

A new format was tried for the workshop time. Instead of lunch in the dining hall, upon leaving the conference hall everyone was handed a boxed lunch. Then out into the rain to the Hitchcock building for a choice of nine workshops. Did I say rain? Friday, God opened the flood gate on Messiah College with over three inches of rain. But God was also looking out for us. It stopped long enough for most of us, except for our feet, to stay dry between buildings. Then the gate opened again.

7:00pm was a Celebration of Ministry which was a service of Commissioning and Ordination of four Provisional elders, two ordained Deacons, and seven Elders.

We reconvened finish to business of reports and voting. The Resolution 1: on "Mental Awareness" and Resolution 2: Establishment of a Home. A Place Everyone" were passed. for Resolution 3: to change the guidelines for the chairperson at administration was declared "out of order". Resolution 4: Proposing Changes to the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church Calling General conference to

change wording in the book of Discipline was not adopted.

Saturday morning was Bible study and more business.

Once again throughout the conference, we filled food bags for world hunger filling our quota with 70,100 bags, raising \$20,900. Special offerings for the three days amounted to over \$26,000. Mission Central raised \$17,300.

Bishop Parks has a campaign called "Partners in Mission. "A statement was made for a \$100.00 check; the Bishop would do 100 pushups. Within a couples minutes Bishop Parks was doing

pushups. I hope in December, we have 2 filled churches to hear Bishop Parks bring the message and that everyone stays for fellowship after worship.

Conference closed with the afternoon's Ordination Service.

Once again, I would like to represent our parish at the 2015 Annual Conference. Even though I have 2 roommates and a room picked out, I will step aside to allow someone else the experience. I can still go as a nonvoting member.

Transform Williamsport

The week of August 11-15, 2014 I had the privilege of God using my hands and feet.

Being the second year First United Methodist Church, Williamsport did a mission outreach in the community, involving twenty-two churches with two hundred fifty plus of God's servants [including kitchen help and child care] at eighty-five original job sites. With the rain some additional inside sites were sought. Although one siding crew talked of putting up tarps so they could work in the rain Tuesday.

We were told to watch for God moments. What a better God moment than for God to send Malachi, Timothy, Elijah, Isaiah, Zachariah (5 brothers) and friend William (an un-named disciple?) Monday to help me weed, pick up trash and broken toys. I wished I had a picture of the boys with gloves on their hand. For some reason I kept buying gloves to replace the ones I threw in the dumpster on the Maryland trip.

I covet your prayers for Zack. Zack is a six year old twin who can have several seizures a day. The seizures can be violent enough that he puts holes in the wall.

Tuesday, I was determined to work in the house. Those who did not know me were sure I was going to croak before I could turn around and walk back out. (Mold and mildew)

I understand, later in the week, someone spilled a whole can of paint on the new wood floor. - Remember last year, I was the one who spilled the paint.

Returning to the Life Center, I was asked to go with four others to a house to help a lady organize her home and wash some windows. This lady has to be close to my age and she believed until a couple weeks ago that she was thirty-six.

Upon entering the kitchen, I started to wash the knick-knacks that were being taken off the glass window shelves. Looking at the kitchen cabinets; I decided I was going to scrub them and the floor while the two men washed windows and Nancy washed the

Tiffany lamp above the table. Carrie took to the upper cabinets and the microwave.

Tuesday's rain put such a damper on Wednesday's outside painting, I was given a kiss on the cheek and sent to our St. John's to sew.

Thursday, I was sent along with a crew that was ready to paint the front porch and garage for an eighty-three old women. She calls herself a roaming Catholic. When it comes prayer time she enters the nearest Catholic Church. She raised eight children, has delivered meals on wheel for 43 years, and on Mondays she takes in ironing.

God sent Thaddeus and Mathew with us. By 2:00 pm I was done with one side of the porch railing and the lattice work underneath.

Friday, I cringed when asked to caulk the garage. After fifteen tubs and having help, I commented, "I don't like the looks of it". The homeowner, "Well don't look at it".

The Blessed week ended with an appreciation dinner that had stories, pictures, food, worship, and communion.
