As a result of the recent General Conference, much discussion has arisen about the nature of the United Methodist Church and what the Church believes, especially in regard to human sexuality. I share many of the same concerns as all of you, per-haps even more so. I have been a part of the UM Church ever since the EUB Church I grew up in, joined with the Methodist Church in 1968 to become the United Methodist Church.

The merger came about because of common theological roots, that being the teachings of John Wesley. That movement originally came to America through lay preachers and swept across the country. They went from town to town setting up little societies and classes that would meet weekly. They would meet to worship, but more importantly they met to aid one another in their Christian Walk of faith. They would challenge one another to be faithful to their commitment to follow Christ through love of God and service to one another. They would help one another to live out the Way of Christ and to put on the character of Christ, and therefore, realize a transformed life.

And it worked. It worked for them because they were diligent in following Christ and in practicing love of one another. All of this was a response to the decay that was prevalent in society, and while the church had sought to hold up Christ as the way, it really didn't offer anything that grounded them in a relationship with God, other than being a part of the church. This is where what John Wesley and the others who joined him made a marked difference. The Methodist movement stressed a life that rose above what was commonly practiced and passed as Christianity. It challenged people to be more than nominal Christians, and to live a disciplined life and to practice a holiness that was based on scripture and lived out both personally and socially.

The Methodist movement was formed to stimulate renewal in the church, and it brought about a revival that swept the land. Which tells me the people were hungry for spiritual things and relationship with God. My feeling is that people are hungry for renewal and a movement of God today as well. An opinion though, that is prevalent in society today is that the church is not relevant to their lives; the church lifts up a high ideal, but the average person knows very few if any Christians that actually live it, and that stings.

As the church, we know what we don't believe in and but I'm not so sure we know what we do believe in. And if the church doesn't really know what it believes, then how we do live out our faith? If someone brings up spiritual matters in a group conversation, they often get flat out rejected. Why are Christians so fearful of talking about things that affect their spiritual life? Could it be they were never taught anything simple enough to remember and to apply? Could it be that church didn't care that much to stress strategies that would help to discipline us spiritually and form us as persons in the likeness of Christ? Could it be that we have taken the easy way out and said, that if you just say you believe in Jesus that you are good to go?

But go where? All we have to do is to look around us and we see the answer. John Wesley believed in some things that lifted the Methodist movement above what was being pushed as Christian spirituality then. I can't list them all here, but he talks about it in a publication called, The Character of a Methodist. I urge you to find it online. But here are a few: He believed in the primacy of scripture. He said, "I allow no other rule, whether of faith or practice, than the Holy Scriptures." He also believed that to be Wesleyan meant to be consciously and proudly a part of the broad ancient tradition of the Christian faith. He affirmed the cardinal doctrine of justification by grace through faith. He recognized the grace of God as "transforming," as well as pardoning. This lies at the heart of John Wesley's thought, and it is the "transforming" grace which, through the work of the Holy Spirit, enables us to conform ever more to the image of Jesus Christ. While there are many more, I share this last one defining characteristic of a Wesleyan Christian, that it requires a commitment to discipleship and accountability. Specifically, it requires of us a commitment to the importance of structured Christian discipleship.

I pray that as you read this you are intrigued enough to desire more information on what it means to be a Wesleyan Christian, born out of the Methodist movement. I urge you to know what it is we believe and stress as primary for faith and life in Jesus Christ. To aid you in this, we will be doing a worship series, starting on June 2 nd on John Wesley's Three Simple Rules, which he gave to each of the societies and classes that were formed as a result of the preaching of the Methodist brethren. They were, "Do No Harm," "Do Good," and "Stay in Love with God."

They indeed were three simple rules, and they greatly impacted those who took them seriously. It may be time for us to reexamine them and our own spiritual lives.




