I would like to share with you the devotional from the September 21 issue of the Henri Nouwen Society (henrinouwen.org). Henri Nouwen (1932–1996) was a priest, professor, and spiritual writer. He authored over 40 books on the spiritual life and spent his final years at L'Arche Daybreak, a community for people with intellectual disabilities. Drawing from his own journey of vulnerability and faith, he invites seekers into deeper intimacy with God, themselves, and others.

This devotion is entitled The Rhythm Of Daily Prayer.

One of the interesting things that happen when we spend time with God in prayer is that we find out how tired and anxious we are. If we don't fall asleep, we find out how full our head is of worries and concerns and things we need to do. While we are trying to be with God, we are busy thinking about all the plans we have made. A thousand distractions will come our way, like jumping monkeys filling a banana tree. As soon as we enter into solitude, we discover how chaotic our inner life is. Suddenly all sorts of thoughts, feelings, and fantasies come to the surface, and we soon find ourselves thinking about old pains and old rewards, about appointments we forgot to keep and letters we forgot to write, about people we hope to see and people we hope we never see, about a future vacation, a possible promotion, or our approaching retirement. Instead of being prayerful we become restless and can't wait until our half hour is over.

Don't be surprised at this. You can't just suddenly shut the door of a house that was always open to strangers and expect no one to knock on the door. It will take a while for these countless distractions to disappear, but eventually they will, especially when they realize that you refuse to open the door to them for at least half an hour. If we faithfully keep our time of prayer, every single day, then slowly the distractions diminish, and our mind and body join in a rhythm of daily prayer.

"The unfolding of your words gives light; it gives understanding to the simple."

- Psalm 119: 130 (NIV)

This devotion originated in Henri's book, *Spiritual Formation* and it tells us that a time of prayer in which we connect with God takes training to get used to a different rhythm than we are accustomed. It requires our soul to be trained to seek and spend time with God, essentially, to slow down. Spending time with God involves a quieting of our minds to dismiss all distractions, which takes a lot of getting used to. We are so caught up in being busy, in fact, we are taught that to be busy is good, and if you aren't busy, then you aren't accomplishing anything. Yet, the more you do, the more there is to do and being still for any period of time seems wrong and out of place.

I've had people tell me that they just can't do this. They can't be still or quiet long enough, that this is just who they are, and they strongly object to me talking about it in a sermon. I wondered if they were feeling a twinge of guilt. My word to them though is, this is not who you are by nature, this is who you have become, and your soul is suffering because of it. To enter deeper into the spiritual life, you must adapt to the rhythm of prayer and quite honestly, of God.

Everything in your life will benefit if you are willing to give yourself permission to sit quietly for a while and seek the presence of God, and there allow God to attend to your soul.

In case you didn't know, your soul and mine is an incredibly needy thing. The soul compasses your mind, your emotions, your body, your spirit, outside influences and relationships and it forms all of this into one functional whole, you. It is incredibly complex, or should I say, you are.

We were created to live in relationship with God and to draw our life from God, but sin has broken that connection, and Jesus has made a connection and relationship with God available to us and with it new life. It is up to us to choose it and to be spiritual reborn from above. A big part then of our new life in Christ is reconnecting with God spiritually and intimately. The thought then, of God coming to attend to us, in itself can be a major shift away from a spirituality to which we have become accustomed. But it is one our soul needs, we need.

It is one I have discovered that I need even more deeply at this point in my life. God will only attend to me to the extent that I make room for him and seek his presence. Your prayers for me are a part of this, so are our prayers for each other. We will have more of this next month, for now practice quieting your soul to spend time with God and allow him to attend to you. Maybe we will have more from Henri.

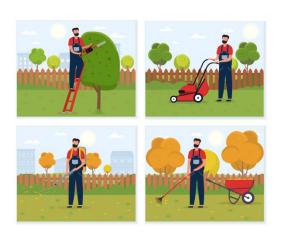
